We hope we didn't confuse you...

Since we sent out our Summer Newsletter, we have received a few questions regarding the changes that are happening in Gondar, so we would like to take this opportunity to clarify the situation. Kate Fereday Eshete founded The Kindu Trust in 1998, as a Child Sponsorship Scheme in Gondar. Since then she has founded two additional initiatives, The Dinkenesh Fund (Kate's animal charity) and the Empress Mentewab School. Until very recently, these three

projects were all housed at a compound in Gondar called the Tara Centre. When Kate moves from Gondar to the Simien Mountains early next year, she will be taking The Dinkenesh Fund and Empress Mentewab School projects with her (the children who attended Empress Mentewab School in Gondar have all been enrolled in alternative schools within the district), although she will always have a link to The Kindu Trust through her role as Honorary President. The Kindu Trust is remaining in Gondar and will be run by our excellent team out there, with an increased level of input from the UK trustees and London office. The Kindu Trust- Ethiopia team have already moved to a new compound, now called The Kindu Centre, where they will continue to focus on the Sponsorship in the Community project. The Trust is keeping the same PO Box Address in Gondar (C/O Marta Bekele, PO Box 1500, Gondar, Ethiopia), so there is no change if you wish to send out parcels.

As of December 2009, The Kindu Trust will be completely financially separate from Kate, which means we are urging all of our supporters who are still making payments to Kate's Ethiopian Bank account to switch to our UK account. You can still use Kate's Gondar bank account to directly support her, and her animal and school projects.

Hair Dresser Training – a cut above the rest!

Tadela Nurie is the older sister of one of The Kindu Trust's beneficiaries. She is the second oldest sibling out of four, looked after by their mother and elderly maternal grandmother. Tadela dropped out of school in grade 4 as she wanted to help support the family by staying at home to do the household chores while her mother earned some money cleaning the streets of Gondar. By the time she turned 17, Taleda was finding her life at home frustrating and disappointing. In 2008, The Kindu Trust gave Taleda a chance to attend hair dresser training at the 'Feti' Art Cosmetology Centre. After completing 8 months of training, she was offered a job as a trainer within the centre. She has now been working in this role for the past 7 months and is earning a monthly salary of 250 birr, which she uses for herself and the house. She has been completely transformed into a happy and responsible young adult, thanks to your support.

Kate's Message from Ethiopia

It's been a challenging year, with continuing high inflation (18.7% in September), poor exchange rates (improved since the 10% birr devaluation in July) and frequent power cuts. Following a long, hot dry season (with bush fires), we had the shortest, least wet rainy season for 25 years. This is causing serious problems for communities in rural and urban areas, as well as trees, and domestic and wild animals (by June bats were dying on my verandah and some trees around my home were already dead). On 22 October the Ethiopian Government made an urgent appeal to the international community for food aid for 6.2 million people at risk of hunger. Furthermore, there is apprehension about the national elections next May, when Prime Minister Meles Zenawi steps down after 18 years in post. Big changes are afoot and our families need your help more than ever before. *Kate Fereday Eshete*

Postcards of Gondar

Another of The Kindu Trust's fledgling projects is to increase the capacity of our souvenir shop in Gondar. The city, with its historic castles and churches, is an essential stop on the tourist circuit, attracting people from a range of different nationalities and walks of life. The end goal is for the Kindu Shop to become a fully sustainable not-for-profit venture, with all 'profits' made being ploughed back into training the mothers and guardians of our beneficiaries with new skills (such as tailoring, weaving and paper making). Sales of the products these women make will provide them with an income, and enable us to slowly increase the diversity of products we are selling. We will keep you updated on our progress towards this goal in future newsletters.

The first new product to reach the shelves of our shop has been a range of postcards and notelets. In October 2009, some of our more artistic beneficiaries drew pictures of the tourist attractions of Gondar and scenes of life in Ethiopia. We then printed some of the best designs as postcards, which look amazing and are already selling like hot cakes! The cards will help to cover the Kindu Shop set up costs.
